ABOUT THE VIVACE CHORUS

Vivace Chorus is a flourishing, ambitious and adventurous choir based in Guildford, which aims to have fun performing and sharing great choral music. The choir has come a long way since it began in 1946 as the Guildford Philharmonic Choir, and now has an enviable reputation for performing first-class concerts across a wide range of musical repertoire.



Particular successes include a sell-out performance in May 2011 of Mahler's Symphony No. 8, the 'Symphony of a Thousand', at the Royal Albert Hall. A highly acclaimed performance of Britten's War Requiem took place in November 2012, followed by another Royal Albert Hall success in May 2014, when we performed the Verdi Requiem. In 2017, we celebrated our 70th birthday with the Philharmonia Orchestra in the Royal Festival Hall.

Since 1995, Vivace has thrived under the exceptional leadership of this evening's conductor, Jeremy Backhouse. Jeremy's passion for choral works and his sheer enthusiasm for music-making are evident at every rehearsal and performance.

In addition to our own concerts in Guildford and London, we also sing in various charity concerts and, with our regular orchestra, the Brandenburg Sinfonia, take part in the Brandenburg Choral Festival each year in St. Martin-in-the-Fields. We also like to take our music-making overseas and have toured to France, Italy, Germany and Austria. After a 'home tour' in the Cotswolds last summer, we are now preparing for a tour of the Baltic States in June 2018.

We're a friendly and sociable choir that enjoys singing traditional choral classics alongside the challenge of contemporary and newly-commissioned music. We are always very happy to welcome new members, so if you would like to try us out, do come along to any of our regular rehearsals on Monday evenings at 7.15 in the Millmead Centre, Millmead, Guildford.

JEREMY BACKHOUSE

Jeremy is one of Britain's leading choral conductors. He began his musical career in Canterbury Cathedral where he was Senior Chorister. In 1980 he was appointed Music Editor at the RNIB, where he was responsible for the transcription of print music into Braille. He has worked for both EMI Classics and later Boosey & Hawkes Music Publishers as a Literary Editor, but now pursues his career as a freelance conductor.

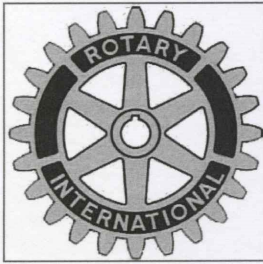


Jeremy has been the sole conductor of the internationally-renowned chamber choir Vasari Singers since its inception in 1980. Since winning the prestigious Sainsbury's Choir of the Year competition in 1988, the Vasari Singers have performed regularly at concert venues and cathedrals throughout the UK and abroad. Jeremy and Vasari have broadcast frequently on BBC Radio and Classic FM, and have a discography of over 25 CDs on the EMI, Guild, Signum and Naxos labels. They have recently launched their own Vasari Media label with a recording of Jonathan Rathbone's 'Under the Shadow of His Wing', which they premiered in 2014. A recent recording of Rachmaninov's 'All-Night Vigil' was released in October 2017.

In January 1995, Jeremy was appointed Music Director of the Vivace Chorus. Alongside the standard classical works, Jeremy has conducted the Vivace Chorus in some ambitious programmes, including Howells' 'Hymnus Paradisi', Szymanowski's 'Stabat Mater', Mahler's 'Resurrection' Symphony (No. 2), Prokofiev's 'Alexander Nevsky and Ivan the Terrible', Mahler's 'Symphony of a Thousand' (No. 8) and Verdi's 'Requiem' in the Royal Albert Hall with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra.

In January 2009, Jeremy took up the post of Music Director of the Salisbury Community Choir. In 2013 the choir celebrated its 21st Anniversary with a major concert in Salisbury Cathedral, featuring the world premiere of a specially-commissioned community work by Will Todd 'The City Garden'. They subsequently toured with it to Lincoln (2014) and Guildford (2015). A commission for a major new work from Alexander L'Estrange is planned for November 2018.

THE ROTARY CLUB OF GUILDFORD



The Rotary Club of Guildford was established in 1922, when only six clubs existed in the whole of Great Britain. Today, there are 1,840 Rotary Clubs in the UK, with over 55,000 members and 1.2 million members in 33,000 Clubs world wide.

Besides the '1922' Guildford Club, there are two other Rotary Clubs in the town - the Guildford District Club, founded in 1975 and the Guildford Chantries Club, founded in 1991.

One of the Club's earliest fundraising projects in the 1920s was its 'Big Brother' scheme, which was launched to help the town's youngsters, who had lost their fathers during the First World War.

In 1927, the Club embarked on a project to raise enough money to install radio sets in the wards of the Royal Surrey County Hospital, so the patients could 'listen in'.

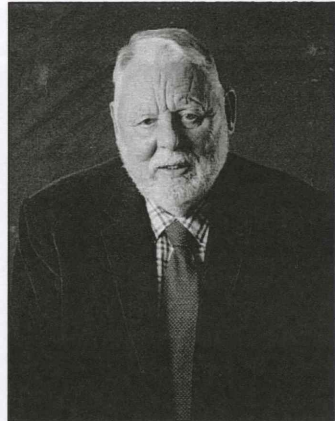


During the Second World War, one of the Club's most memorable humanitarian events was dealing with the reception of the soldiers from the beaches of Dunkirk, when special troop trains stopped at Guildford Station in June 1940.

In the 1960s, the Rotary Club of Guildford played a significant fundraising role to establish the Yvonne Arnaud Theatre. In 1965 the Club successfully lobbied government departments to establish the University of Surrey in Guildford in 1966. Formerly the Battersea College of Technology, the University celebrated its 50th Anniversary in October last year.

To mark the centenary of the Rotary movement in 2005, Guildford's three Rotary Clubs established their 'Guildford Historic Trail' around the town centre and presented it to the Borough of Guildford. The trail takes visitors and tourists on a circular tour for a closer look at some of the town's famous landmarks.

Last October, the Club raised £4,885 for Terry Waite's charity 'Hostage UK', when the former hostage gave a thought provoking talk to an audience of 200 people in Holy Trinity Church about his 5 years as a prisoner in the Middle East from 1987 till 1991. 'Hostage UK' supports hostages and their families by providing specialist and pastoral care, both during and after a kidnap has taken place.

During the year, our Club, with other Rotary Clubs in the district, have raised funds for Woking's Sam Beare hospice and last month, the Club held its annual Bridge Day and raised over £2000 for their chosen charity *Cherry Trees*, a respite home from home in East Clandon, that provides short breaks for children and young people with learning, physical and sensory disabilities, giving their families a much-needed break.

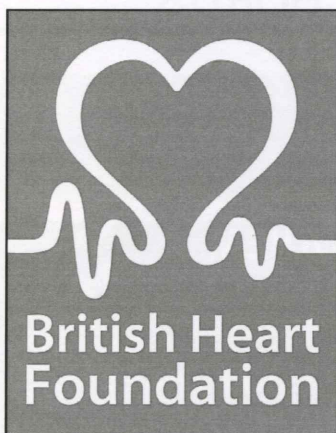
The Club continues to run heats for local Guildford schools in their annual Rotary Youth Speaks competition, which is part of a national contest designed to foster pupil's vital public speaking skills. Other continuing projects include the Club's Jaipur Limb Project, Rotary International's 'End Polo Now' campaign and the Club's own Global Sight Solutions Eye Project, which has established specialist eye hospitals in India and Africa to cure blindness in the developing world.

And tonight, the Mayor's Christmas Concert, organised by Guildford Rotary, is still raising funds for the Mayor of Guildford's Local Distress Fund - a registered charity that gives small grants of money to Guildford people in genuine need.

Despite being in one of the most affluent parts of Surrey, Guildford still has, nonetheless, pockets of deprivation, where people struggle to make ends meet on a daily basis, needing the most basic items, that most of the rest of us just take for granted.

THE MAYOR'S CHOSEN CHARITY



The Mayor's chosen charity for his Mayoral year is the British Heart Foundation (BHF). Most of us have known someone who has suffered a heart attack or indeed lost a friend or loved one through heart disease. For over 50 years, the British Heart Foundation has pioneered research, which has transformed the lives of millions of people living with cardiovascular disease.

Before the 1970s, heart attacks were poorly understood. as there were no medicines to treat them and most victims lost their lives. Thanks to BHF Professor Michael Davis, whose valuable research actually proved that heart attacks are caused by a blood clot in the coronary artery, this ground breaking work has paved the way for clot-busting drugs. Now, although each year, 175,000 people in the UK may still suffer a heart attack, around 7 out of 10 people survive. thanks to the modern treatments built on BHF discovery

Locally, the Guildford and Godalming branch of the British Heart Foundation has been a vanguard organisation, whose volunteers have worked tirelessly for many years to raise much needed funds to support the work of the cardiovascular department at the Royal Surrey County hospital. These volunteers have raised thousands and thousands of pounds, which has paid for heart monitoring and other essential equipment for the hospital.

The Mayor continues to work in partnership with these volunteers to support their work and help capitalise on their outstanding achievements. Tonight, a retiring collection in aid of the British Heart Foundation will take place as you leave Holy Trinity Church, so please support this very worthwhile charity. Thank you.
