al, which runs from July 13 to
July 24, ranges from an organ
ecital by Mark Blatchly at

Guildford Cathedral to a late-
night concert of the songs of
Rodgers and Hammerstein at
the Yvonne Arnaud Theatre.

The Spanish theme of the
festival is carried through into
the music as the 400th anniver-
sary of the Armada is celebrat-
ed. Guildford Philharmonic
Choir is presenting a pro-
gramme entitled *The Tudor*
Connection at Holy Trinity
Church at the end of the festi-
val's first week and a selection
of chamber music *From the*

Armada to Cape Trafalgar can
be heard at St. Mary's Church
at the beginning of the second
week.

The Spanish Connection is a
classical guitar concert by the
Arenstein-Doy featuring dis-
tinctive sounds of Spain at the
Guildhall; *Music for Elizabeth*
at Christ Church promises "a
pageant of 16th-century Eliza-
bethan music." Guildford
Cathedral Choir and the Alder
Valley Aldershot Brass Band
are massing together to present



a vigorous and varied pro-
gramme on July 16.

The musical climax of the
festival will come from the
Guildford Philharmonic
Orchestra when it performs a
Spanish Fiesta conducted by
Norman Del Mar at the Civic
Hall on July 23.

The programme includes
music by De Falla, Turina and
Chabrier.
